
An Example of How Children are Seeing and Learning about a Range of Cultures and Diversity

The children read about Diwali, had a go at making their own lanterns, ate traditional Indian food and one of our wonderful parents brought their Lehenga, traditional Indian clothes in to show and talk to the children about.

We always like to celebrate different cultures and traditions which are meaningful to the children.

This week we got to celebrate the Mid-Autumn Festival with one of our families, this festival is also known as the Moon Festival or Mooncake Festival and is a harvest festival celebrated in Chinese culture.


The event, is the second biggest after Lunar New Year. It falls on the fifteenth day of the eighth month in the traditional Chinese lunar calendar and took place on the 17 September this year.

On the night of the festival, people celebrate the full moon and give thanks for the Autumn harvest.

We looked at some special lanterns, lit festival candles and tasted a mooncake this is a traditional baked item lots of people eat and give to others as gifts. They are round pastries with rich, thick fillings like red bean or lotus seed paste and the children thought it was delicious!

We then designed our own mooncakes!

Nowruz, meaning "New Day" in Persian, marks the first day of spring and the beginning of the New Year in the Persian solar calendar.

Thank you to H and family for helping us to celebrate with a wonderful Haft Sin and cupcakes.

The Haft Sin table, or the table of seven things that start with the letter "s" (س) in Persian, is a central part of Nowruz and a family tradition and the children enjoyed learning all about this tradition and creating their own.

We practiced some Persian words, made cards, learnt lots of interesting facts about Haft Sin and Nowruz and how it's celebrated over the 13 days we also watched a lovely Mickey Mouse blog (Below) all about Nowruz which was sent to us by H's Mummy.

Another of our meaningful Christmas activities this week has been our outing to All Saints Church! It's so lovely to have such a wonderful relationship with Rev. Wilton!

The children had so many questions to ask him Some about his job How old the church is? If he is getting a yoyo for Christmas? Does he like being a vicar? Where is the Queen? Why did she die? Which is his favourite church? Does he like Easter?

Our favourite had to be when he asked why we get presents at Christmas and A burst into "because girls and boys won't get any toys if they don't pull me out"

Rev. Wilton answered all the important 3 and 4 year old questions very well and the children think he deserves a sticker!!

We spoke about the different coloured candles and Rev. Wilton explained the four advent candles are lit each week leading up to Christmas.

There are three purple candles, one is for hope, one symbolizing preparation and one for love. There is one pink candle for joy and the last candle is white for purity, regeneration, godliness, light and victory!

Rev. Wilton then had to leave to go to a funeral so we had lots of time to explore the church independently in groups of three with a grown up!

We showed curiosity at the stained glass, found a wooden mouse on the candlestick, lit a candle each for our family, sang Christmas songs, read Christmas stories and had lunch in the beautiful church.
